2nd period Waterloo collapse costly 8-5

The Thunder Bay Twins pionship tilts. took a giant step towards another United States Hockey League championship with a convincing 8-5 victory over-Waterloo at. McElroy Auditorium Sunday afternoon.

The Twins, leading 2-0 in the best-of-five game series, now must win just one more game on home ice to capture the 1973-74 USHL crown.

The Black Hawks' stumbling block Sunday afternoon was the second period, when they were outscored 5-0 by the machine-like Twin attack:
